Big question: What kind of world do I want?

Key vocab: achievements, shared needs, freedom, fairness, kindness, responsibility



Knowledge outcomes: Students should know about the following common features of a humanist approach to building a healthy society

Introduction

- Begin with the 'A humanist approach to life: a summary' slide to introduce/recap the core features of a humanist approach to life.
- Explain that you are going to explore some of the goals and ambitions humanists have for building what they believe would be a better world in which everyone can live well together.

Special places

- Carry out the Special places activity to explore how the types of buildings humanists might value are those that improve people's quality of life.

Humanist goals

- Carry out the Humanist goals activity to introduce the students to the value humanists place on freedom, fairness, and kindness.

Human responsibility

- Read the Starfish Thrower story and/or show the film ([youtube.com/watch?v=Z-aVMdJ3Aok](https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Z-aVMdJ3Aok)), then discuss the meaning of the story with the students and the humanist belief that we must take action if we want to make the world a better place.

Summary and assessment

- Review the knowledge outcomes above.
- Ask the students what questions they would like to ask a humanist.
